

Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' - John 11:25-26



Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The scripture verses above are taken from the account of Jesus coming at the call of Mary and Martha because their brother Lazarus was very sick. Jesus came too late, and Lazarus had passed. And yet, through the power of Christ's spoken word commanding the man to rise, he did, and for Lazarus there was new life.

I offer these verses because Jesus is speaking to us just as much as he is speaking to Mary and to Martha who are filled with grief at the passing of their brother. In some ways we are like Mary and Martha, weeping at the tomb of something that has passed. The church is not what is was, and many within the church see this as a kind of death. And yet, just as Jesus turned to these two sisters and spoke the words above, so he turns to us offering us the same truth and asking us the same question. Do we believe this? That those who believe in Christ, even though they die, and everyone who believes in Christ will never die. Do we believe this? If so, then even as we mourn what has passed, we should know that what lies before us is more amazing than anything we could have hoped for.

Jesus stands at the entrance to the tomb in this story, and in our lives he stands at the doors of our church. In both cases, he calls out, not to someone or something that is dead, but rather newly alive. In Christ we find new life, even when we feel like we have reached the end of our rope.

In the last year we have seen new life spring in lots of ways at St. Paul's. I have been blessed to partner with Rev. Michelle when she joined the team in May. We have also seen the revitalization of the Christian Education committee which has driven a refocus on building a strong Sunday School to feed the spiritual needs of our youth. Even as we have striven to strengthen our youth opportunities, we have also continued to offer faith building gatherings for adults in the form of men's and women's book studies. In the fall we also began to explore our Holy Text in a new way through the Narrative lectionary. This approach took us through the Hebrew Testament, to the feet of the prophets, and alongside the Christ, stories that flow one to another, revealing to us the endless ways that God tries to reach out for us, and the endless opportunities that we are offered to turn again to God and walk in the light of new life.

With every new year, indeed every new day, Christ stands at the door and calls us out, calls us from the darkness of what has gone by into the light of something new. By his word we are empowered and inspired to walk a new way. By his love we are given new strength to walk together.

No Correspondence

Ron provided overview of Financial Statements for 2016, highlighting importance of good weather working in our favour and recommending regular giving as opposed to year end gifts. Ron moved the adoption of the financial report, 2nd Alastair Lamont. congregational vote by card, motion carried

Discussion ensued on amortization/depreciation of assets from Note 1 (c) on page 1 of the financial statement.

Ron Naugler moved that Dave Thorne chair the rest of the meeting and Kelly Simpson to act as secretary, 2nd Greg Morton, motion carried

David Thorne took over the meeting and Kelly Simpson continued as secretary

Nomination from Ron Naugler for Jennifer Petryshen to the Board, Kelly Simpson 2nd, congregation voted in favour, motion carried

no names put forward for Ministry & Personnel

Ron Naugler made a motion for nomination and election of Presbytery Representatives Dave Thorne, Marguerite MacAlpine, Isabel Green, and alternates Blaine Irving & Ron Naugler. Harold Raper 2nd, congregation voted in favour, motion carried

Committee Reports

Trustees-Andrew Steeves talked about the property and it is in good condition, however, major renovations are in the range of \$700,000 or more. Andrew suggests a solution in the way of bequests, willed gifts etc. and feels those may already exist but they are unknown at this time and requested that this info be shared privately with himself, one of the ministers or Dave Thorne.

Annual Meeting continued

Adoption of 2017 Budget- Ron Naugler explained the revenue vs expenditures figures, projected deficit of \$14,200 for 2017

Ann Raper queried financial help from Conference for covering expenses for Rev Richard's absences- Rev Richard explained there are some funds available to help if we don't have a minister from St Paul's who can cover, however Pastor Sarah will be available until her maternity leave begins and Rev Michelle will also be available once she starts her position May 1. Dave Thorne reminded us we can have the executive director from Conference come explain more & answer questions.

Roger Miller asked about government grants for assistance. Ron Naugler confirmed we have looked into these. They often require a large investment on our part so not always feasible but options in this regard are well monitored.

Ron moved the approval for the budget for 2017, 2nd by Alana Palmer voted by card, motion carried.

Appointment of EPR Daye Kelly & Associates for 2017 to review financial statements moved by Ron Naugler, 2nd Greg Morton, voted by card, motion carried.

Empowerment that the board be able to move on the congregation's behalf in the absence of a meeting, motion by Greg Morton, 2nd Dave Thorne, congregation voted in favour, motion carried.

Visioning at St Paul's-the board is encouraging the continued collaboration and connection with other United Churches working together (Ron Naugler)

Ron Naugler moved that "we have a Spring Congregational Meeting no later than Sunday May 7, 2017 and the agenda will include an item called Future Plans and Goals-each committee and ministers: 2nd Greg Morton. Vote by card, motion carried.

UCW Donna Chauvin presented a cheque for \$5000 to Ron Naugler for the cost of sanding refinishing the floors in Fraser Memorial Hall

Stewardship Committee nominations- Roger Miller volunteered

Pastor Sarah's contract extension moved by Ron Naugler, 2nd Kelly Simpson motion carried campus ministry annual gift \$1500

Ron moved to nominate Larry Buick for the M&P committee, 2nd Harold Raper, carried

Cathy Simpson gave a thank you to Ron Naugler for his time as Chair of Finance for his helpfulness and teaching

Greg moved to adjourn meeting 1:06, Pastor Sarah offered a benediction

Minutes of St. Paul's United Church Congregational Meeting Oct. 1, 2017

Derrick Grant called the meeting to order at 11:46 am.

Rev. Michelle opened with a prayer 11:47.

- 1. Michelle announced a "Welcome Event" refugees. Oct 14th, 2:00 pm at St. Paul's.
- Lynne Naugler mentioned rummage sale from yesterday. She told us about a family in need who came and picked up all manner of household items, for free and were absolutely delighted
- 3. Anne motioned, seconded by Jane, for acceptance of agenda.
- 4. Greg Morton started us off with a report on investments. He reported we have \$165,000 in the restoration fund. This money is earmarked for long-term building maintenance. He reported we have \$100,000 invested with an elite investment firm which ordinarily does not do business with investors below 1 million. He reported from May 19th to present we've had a 7.9% return since then. He also reported we have \$50,000 invested cash and are gaining minimal interest on those funds. He also reported \$56,000 invested in Trust which has gained 5.56% so far this year. He stressed that all funds are invested in conservative holdings such as municipal bonds.
- 5. Greg then transitioned to the Property committee report. He proceeded to advise us that property was working with M&P in the search for a new Sexton. He said we are in "dire need" and asked if anyone had any suggestions to please "let us know!" He discussed advertising rental spaces next week including; office space, gym, kitchen, & washrooms. Again he requested anyone with a lead to "please let us know." He also reported that at present we offer a free space for AA & the GED program. He told us about recent projects such as the massive cleanup of the sanctuary basement. There were 200 years of stuff accumulated. We hired a student to help clean up. John Leroux came in to review these items to ensure there was nothing of historical or monetary value. Property replaced a floor and a radiator and painted and performed general repairs over the year. They reinforced the sanctuary floor and met with trustees and engineers to explore some minor work that will need to be done to the steeple. Future plans include seeking a tour guide for next summer. Discussions are taking place regarding working on pulpit area in order to rent out the sanctuary for concerts and similar type events. Greg closed by asking in anyone had ideas, complaints, and suggestions to please contact him.
- 6. Derrick asked if trustees had a report none were present.
- 7. Donna Chauvin gave the UCW report. She mentioned meals & wheels were having a dinner from 2 -4 at government house and the UCW was invited to attend. She asked if anyone wanted to attend to please approach her for details. Donna also mentioned the UCW is looking for apple peelers! They need to peel 100 lbs. as they are making pies Oct. 19th, 9:00 am. She also mentioned on Nov. 4th there will be a luncheon. Donna moved that the UCW should have a rep on the board, the move was seconded followed by discussion. Michelle explained our current model of governance and explained we can't nominate a board member at a congregational meeting. Jane Blakely further explained the transition to our current model. She suggested exploring how we can increase communication with the UCW. It was suggested that perhaps Donna consider letting her name stand should she be nominated to the board in the near future. Donna, smiling, withdrew her motion.
- 8. Trustee's suggested long-time members should bring a "replacement in training" to meetings in order to help train people to step in.

Congregational Meeting (continued) Oct. 1, 2017

Michelle gave a short report from the Christian Education committee. She reported that Sunday school added a new class. We now have 3-6, 7-9 & teens. We are also running a men's group & spirit sisters. Senior Bible study is meeting regularly, there are prayers in the parlour, and we are exploring larger programs such as Alpha. Last, youth group is meeting every second Friday and we had ten youth last time!

Colleen gave the worship committee report. She said thanks for the support for potlucks. She mentioned how they are planning Advent season. She asked if we could mention in the bulletin that it would be helpful to return service folders to assigned places for recycling. They are planning anniversary Sunday and she discussed bringing in an expert in "narrative theology" for that service. She also mentioned the worship committee is looking for new members.

Derrick explained the role & work of the board. He mentioned the importance of trying to increase the visibility of the board. He mentioned the efforts of the board to understand our role and to make ourselves more available to the congregation. He mentioned the upcoming nominations for M&P and stressed how important that committee is. He also discussed the ongoing efforts to discern and articulate our "mission" and how we endeavour to do that in close dialogue with committees and to the congregation.

Ron Naugler gave a short introduction on Jane Blakely & Linda Lamont as nominees to M&P. Roger Miller seconded Jane Blakely and Linda Lamont was seconded by Tammy. Jane Blakely spoke on the current lineup of M&P. She discussed work on finding Sexton & the qualifications. She mentioned how excellent a team St. Paul's has right now and is very excited about the future.

Ron Naugler gave the finance committee report. He moved that Cathy Davis be given signing authority – seconded by Greg – passed. Greg stated that two signatures are always required. It was moved that Greg have signing authority for legal documents – seconded by Kelly Simpson - approved.

Michelle Armstrong asked the question, "Why do people give to the church?" Michelle mentioned the youth group, and how they experience the holy in simple moments such as working together to make kettle corn. Michelle mentioned a man from the brown bag program who was struggling with loss and how much St. Paul's helps both feed and comfort people. Michelle reminded us how much St. Paul's does to help people.

Ron Naugler gave his report. Every month Cathy Simpson produces her report and it's vitally important. After discussing the numbers he reminded us we resolved to increase our giving and other revenue-generating activities by 20%, and we are presently slightly below where we need to be. Greg Morton asked about us reaching out to inactive members. Donna suggested many people need a ride.

Discussion followed the idea or organizing volunteers to transport people to & from the church.

Derrick Grant closed the meeting at 1:01

Michelle Armstrong ended with a prayer.

Congregational Board 2017

This year has seen a number of changes at St. Paul's, with the departure of our Sexton Joe Robicheau, and the maternity leave of Pastor Sarah Magie, our Minister on loan from the Canadian Armed Forces. We also hired and welcomed a new minister.



In May we welcomed Rev. Michelle Armstrong, her husband Mike, and son Reid into our church family. The congregation received them with open arms. Michelle has been sharing her gifts with us since she joined our team ministry at St. Paul's.

Dr. Sharon Pond, our music director, continues to provide St. Paul's with music on Sunday's and special occasions. Dr. Sharon Pond also works with a youth choir, as well as putting on special organ recitals in St. Paul's. Her efforts raise the profile of our church and we appreciate all that she does.

Some of the other committees and their work included:

- The Pantry continued to minister to families in need, serving brown bag lunches to those in need and operating a pantry to supply families with food and home supplies.
- Our Stewardship committee reached is beginning to get more active, planning for fundraising and raising awareness to St. Paul's members of the role of Church in the community.
- The Property committee ensured that the heating system continues to receive proper maintenance. Masonry repairs have been made to the exterior of the church, and the floor of Fraser Hall was refinished this year. A new sexton was also hired.
- The Worship committee was busy as well, providing the congregation with memorable and meaningful services
- UCW continue to raise money through various efforts and carefully prepares food for funeral receptions. They do a great job of representing our church and serving our community.
- The Trustees continue their work of ensuring that the church structure is in good repair. This year there was a focus on the steeple and bell tower. The Trustees are looking at ways to fund the repair and maintenance in the long term.
- The Ministry and Personnel Committee has new members and they have been busy serving the needs of our staff at St. Paul's

The Board of St. Paul's continues to work with the various committees of St. Paul's to ensure that we can continue in our mission. ST. PAUL'S FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT 2017

Our committee reports to the Congregational Board at each of the monthly board meetings and to the congregation by speaking at other meetings and church services. We are always available to discuss our finances and to receive your suggestions and recommendations, for a fact..... we encourage it!

We are presently in need of a new Chair of Finance and 1 more member for our committee.

We perform our duties in cooperation with Cathy Simpson, our office administrator.

We have the responsibility to review the current financial position monthly for all 5 operating funds. This review includes examining each general ledger (revenue, expenditure, assets and liabilities) for accuracy and information. We continually compare the actual results with the budget and implement the necessary corrective action to increase revenue, control and reduce expenditures and monitor our assets and liabilities. We make monthly projections to determine the financial results for the year.

We are responsible to establish and implement policies and procedures which help to ensure proper control of our revenue, expenditures and assets, including weekly offerings.

We manage St. Paul's marketable securities for the housing, foundation and trust funds.

We coordinate with Cathy Simpson in the preparation of the annual financial statements for review by EPR Daye Kelly & Associates. This is a major function for Cathy and our committee. There is considerable preparation involved in assembling the financial information and statements for EPR Daye Kelly & Associates at year end.

We review the draft and final financial statements prepared by EPR Daye Kelly & Associates and approve the figures and notes attached to these statements. It is our responsibility to sign the financial statement for the year on behalf of St Paul's United Church. We then present these financial statements for approval at the annual congregation meeting. We are pleased to say that we had a fairly successful year!

It is also our responsibility to prepare in cooperation with church committees the annual operating budget. It has been a challenge to present a balanced operating budget and 2018 will prove to be a greater challenge for 2018.

Please keep St. Paul's in mind when considering your annual donations budget and when preparing your will.

LET'S TALK PAR....

The PAR program is a tremendous help in allowing us to budget our monthly/yearly income, if you are on PAR we can depend on your contributions each month whether you are sitting in one of our pews, on a beach, or playing a round of golf in a foreign country. This helps us to know how much we can afford to spend on projects throughout the year.

Won't you *please* consider helping us to help you and your church to grow and prosper in 2018 and the years beyond!

There is no set amount to donate monthly on PAR—it is whatever you wish to donate, \$10, \$50, \$300 ... the choice is yours and we are very grateful for any donations.

We would like to ask that you try it for a couple of months; if you do not feel comfortable with this system of donating we will remove you from the PAR program and you can go back to using envelopes no questions asked.

Your donation can be deducted from your bank account or paid on your credit card (allowing you to collect air miles, PC points, cash back, etc.) on the amount you donate monthly. There is no service fee for you and it is very easy to set up.

We currently have approximately 35% of our congregation on PAR—some churches have a much higher percentage, as high as 95%. Let's try to catch up!!

St. Paul's Trustees Report 2017

Trustees are responsible for the financial and physical assets of the Church including the sanctuary, hall and two rental properties.

The Trustees serving in 2017 were Noreen Barwise, Frank Goddard, Mary Dingee Jacobs, Roland Krause, Royal MacDonald, Jean Street and Andrew Steeves.

The Trustees met three times during the year: March 8th, June 13rd and December 11th. Minutes of these meetings have been submitted to the Church Office.

During the year the Trustees focused attention on the steeple and bell tower of the sanctuary. A survey of the steeple by Opus consultants revealed that our steeple is almost vertical – remarkable for its age. A tour of the bell tower by members of the Trustees and Property Committee with structural engineers and masonry experts revealed that the structure is in good overall condition but requires repairs to some of the structural timbers and other woodwork and portions of the masonry. The Trustees have already approved repairs to the wooden structure this spring and plan to schedule an inspection of the stonework later this year.

The Trustees congratulate the Church Board and staff on their stewardship of St. Paul's assets. We offer special thanks to our Property Committee for exceptional contributions.

Our church is run well and with love. However, the St. Paul's congregation faces a major expenditure – the repair and rehabilitation of the York Street façade of the sanctuary – and does not have the financial assets in the St. Paul's Foundation to pay for this project (estimated at \$700,000 plus). This work will likely be required within the next 20 years.

The Trustees have a vision for our sanctuary and hall which foresees them used for worship, gatherings, entertainment and other community activities 100 years from today. However, to achieve this vision we need to raise over \$1,000,000 to fund repairs and renovations to these assets on a sustainable basis. Raising these funds will be a priority for the Trustees over the next few years.

Please remember St. Paul's in your prayers, bequests and wills.

ST PAUL'S UNITED CHURCH PROPERTY COMMITTEE 2017Annual Report

The Property Committee's mandate is to maintain, upgrade and protect the Church's physical plant and assets. Examples are: a) Property Maintenance b) Property upgrades c) Boiler and ground repairs d) Security f) Organ.

Members are John Gaskin, Derrick Grant (Vice Chair), Kyle Mathers (Vice Chair), Harold Raper, Patty Trail, Walter Bidlake and Gregory Morton (Chair).

We are an active hands on Committee with several very skilled members whose input saves the Church expenses by completing projects in house. Our Repair and Maintenance budget for 2017 was \$13,400 with \$10,717 spent. Boiler Maintenance Budget was \$7,500 with \$9,945 spent (some heating system repairs were completed in December, 2016 but were only paid in January 2017).

Work completed in 2017

The largest project by far was the massive job of cleaning out the Sanctuary basement which had accumulated items for years. We had Historian John Leroux come in and examine the things we wanted to discard to assess whether they had any value. We sold metal items for recycling, gave away many unneeded old chairs and other items, brought excess stain glass windows upstairs and sold them. Most of the work was done by Rusty Blakely who was hired under the Canada Student Program and assisted by John Gaskin and Sexton joe Robicheau.

Other projects:

- -Touch up painting in the Sanctuary upstairs and down and in the sound room
- -Had the flooring repaired in the downstairs men's washroom
- -Replaced a radiator in the Sanctuary
- -Repaired holes in the parking lot pavement
- -Painted the Church exterior doors (lots of compliments even from outside the congregation-thanks to Patty Trail and our interior decorator)
- -Painted the exterior side and back concrete walls of the Hall
- -We contracted out the refinishing of the Hall floor which I am sure you all have noticed
- -We had pointing work done by masonries on the exterior hall walls
- -After a meeting with Property, Trustees and engineers, it was decided to reinforce the Sanctuary Floor and we hired masonries to complete the work in the basement
- -The Church front door closer was repaired but it may need further work
- -After a meeting with Property, Trustees and engineers, it was decided that some work will be required in the Steeple Tower but in general it is in good shape. To be followed up
- -Extensive work was performed to the Church boiler and it worked smoothly the latter part of 2017
- -The interior Bell Tower areas (which had not been touched for years) were cleaned with minor repairs
- -The interior/exterior wall of two of the "wells "off the front parking lot were repaired
- -Renovated the "paint" room off the downstairs gym

Projects for 2018

We replaced the four windows in the GED room (upper floor) (completed in early 2018)-

- -We will apply again for the Canada Student Program-(Maintenance Assistant & Tour Guide)
- Paint the Hall
- One large project which had been considered I.e. renovating the front of the Sanctuary (taking out pews, re-arranging the pulpit) in order to build a stage so we could lease the Sanctuary for various performances. This is a very ambitious and costly project and the Board decided to postpone it subject to a possible future review.
- -We are still trying to rent the former YMCA room and we have it listed on KIJIJI.
- -We work closely with the Church Sexton and we thank Abdulsalam Zakaria (Sam) for his support. He has adapted very quickly to his new position.
- -Members of the Congregation are encouraged to inform us of items that require our attention or if you have ideas or suggestions regarding the maintenance of the Church and/or Fraser Memorial Hall.
- -The Property Committee is always in need of additional members and we invite anyone interested to try us out. The work is very rewarding.

St Paul's United Church Christian Education Committee Annual Report 2017

The Christian Education Committee was formed in February 2017 with the goal of coordinating the Sunday School curriculum and events, engaging the youth of the church in faith focused gatherings and exploring new opportunities to learn and grow in faith as a congregation through adult programs.

Year in review

Sunday School

- ♦ For the 2017-2018 Sunday School year, class division/ages: Primary, children ages 4 to 6; Junior, ages 7 to 10; and Intermediate, ages 11 and up. Jennifer Sutherland Green teaches the Primary class with the assistance of Bexie Simpson. Donna Chauvin teaches the Juniors. In support of these teachers, Cathy Davis and Mary Staples assist by preparing the weekly lessons for their use. Rev. Michelle Armstrong organizes the curriculum and leadership for the Intermediates. The Sunday morning youth program is based on narrative lectionary reading heard on Sunday morning in worship.
- The Nursery (children up to age 4) is "staffed" by Mary Stickles and Mike Armstrong.
- Primary and Junior classes follow the Deep Blue One Room Sunday School curriculum.
- Education in United Church Outreach Programs will be included in the winter/spring sessions. The children will be made aware of both our local church outreach and the national church outreach and see their part in this work.
- In September, 2017, individual postcards were mailed to all children on the congregational mail list. The postcards welcomed the child to Sunday School and gave pertinent information re time and place.
- The weekly church bulletins include an item summarizing the Sunday School lesson for that week.

Youth programs

- A youth group was formed led by Rev. Michelle Armstrong in June 2017. This group meets on a biweekly basis on Friday evenings.
- This has been a successful and engaging program to date with positive feedback from both youth and parents. Attendance for these youth events has reached from 2-10 participants.
- The Youth group has also participated in worship through drama on two occasions, the first was a
 drama on communion in October and the second was a dramatization of scripture on the first Sunday in Advent.

Adult programs

- The Men's conversation group meets on Wednesday evenings for discussion and fellowship. This

- Spirt Sisters is a women's group that meets weekly on Monday evenings for discussion and fellowship. This year, the topic was centered around the book: "Bullseye: Aiming to Follow Jesus" by Jamie Holtom & Debbie Johnson
- The Senior Bible Study meets weekly on Tuesday mornings and is open to men and women.
- Prayers in the Parlour are led by Rev Michelle Armstrong and Rev Richard Bowley every Wednesday morning at 10am in the Ladies Parlour. Prayers center around the church and events going on in the wider community and around the world.
- Campus ministry Brad Green and Rev. Michelle Armstrong are active members of the committee that oversees the chaplain at UNB.

Upcoming events, goals and initiatives

The committee had developed a short survey to be distributed to the congregation later this Spring to determine what types of events and programs are of interest.

The Christian Education Committee has started the planning and coordination of the congregational/ Sunday School picnic to be held in June 2018.

The committee is looking at organizing family night events to engage the growing number of young families in the congregation.

MISSION STATEMENT: To assist needy families in our community by providing food and household items to augment services they receive elsewhere.

The need for assistance for less fortunate families in our community increases daily. At the end of last year we were serving 82 families. At the end of December this year we had 96 families. Broken down in groups they are: Single women, 19, single men, 17, couples, 11, two-parent families, 16, one-parent families, 33. We have new folks coming for help nearly every week.

We continue to use the point system allowing 10 points for a single person increasing to 15 for a couple and 5 points for each child, to a maximum of 30 points per month.

Pantry Sunday is the first Sunday of each month. A list of most needed items is placed in the bulletin the previous Sunday.

We accept donations of non-perishable food and household items as well as monitory donations for which you receive a receipt for income tax purposes.

Our shelves have been kept well stocked this year thanks to the wonderful support of our congregation. Money in our account is also used to make up shortages that are needed.

There are 18 volunteers in all, 4 helping each Wednesday morning.

The service received by our clients is very much appreciated and expressed every time they come to The Pantry.

On behalf of our volunteers I wish to thank the congregation for all their donations given over the past year. Your support is so very much appreciated.

The Interchurch Refugee Committee 2017

The Ramadam family arrived in July, 2016. They are from Syria and had been living in a refugee camp in Lebanon. Their English is improving. Our commitment to this family ended in July, 2017. With the help of Mesbah's sister's family, they are adjusting to Canadian life.

In August 2017, another Syrian family, the Alrahi family, arrived in Fredericton, NB. They have two children, a little girl who is in kindergarten and a baby boy who is now seven months old. They have made many friends, both inside and outside, the Syrian community. They attend English classes at the Multi-culural Association. The family is very appreciative of the assistance they have received and will continue to receive until July 31st, 2018.

Another family that arrived last fall is the Shege family, Eugene and his three daughters and a grandchild. Their English is very good. Eugene is working at the hospital and the three daughters are attending Eastern College and working part time. They are from the Congo, and arrived here from a Uganda refugee camp. They have many relatives who have been here for several years to support them.

As well, we have assisted Shakir, from Iraq. He has been here for three years and attempting to bring his wife to Canada. He presently works at two part time jobs.

ADULT EDUCATION (GED Classes)

Each week from Monday to Friday, adult education classes are held at St. Paul's. Most of the learners are working on completing the requirements for their GED Certificate. Others are taking academic upgrading. The majority of the learners are referred to the program by an employment or social development counsellor; self referrals are also accepted. The classes are structured so that each person is given the help that he or she needs to succeed. Learners may attend full or part-time and they choose which subject areas they want to focus on. In order to successfully complete the program they must pass five GED tests: Reading, Writing, Math, Science and Social Studies. With their GED certificate, learners can continue their education at a community college or enter the work force.

Thank you to the congregation of St. Paul's for your support of this valuable program. By providing us a safe and welcoming space in which to learn, you are opening doors for others.

St. Paul's also hosted the first Maritime Organ Academy in July.


I played an organ recital at St. James Cathedral in Toronto in June and in Woodstock, NB and St. Andrews Presbyterian Church in July.


