Advent allows us to prepare our hearts and minds to welcome Christ, and it is a time to reflect on our lives to see what needs to be moved out to make space.

Part of Advent is to listen to our longing for Christ and the abundant life he calls us to. Lives filled with hope, peace, joy and love. In this season of to-do lists and I-want lists, listening to what we long for most deeply can give us a sense as to how ready we are to welcome Christ. What do you long for?

Christian mystic Meister Eckhart wrote "The soul must long for God in order to be set aflame by God's love: but if the soul cannot yet feel the longing, then it must long for the longing. To long for the longing is also from God."

In the bible, leading up to the time when Jesus was born, we hear from the prophets about a deep longing for God to be manifest. The call, "how long must we wait?" rings clearly. There was a deep longing for God's promises of peace, where lion will lay with the lamb and no one would be hungry or afraid. A longing for a world where all will be loved and accepted for who they are, and their gifts affirmed. A longing for justice and mercy to prevail. A longing for someone to take the messed up world and turn it around, the longing for God to show up and make it better.

Looking out at our world, I know that longing all too well. As we read the prophets, I can see the world they describe as God's vision and I want it desperately to be our reality, not just words on a page. It is in this place that God continues to speak to my heart, fanning me to act in ways that help to birth this reality into our present moment. It is in the recounting of these visions and promise that they will come, that I find renewed energy to keep seeking the kingdom of God and a deeper connection with our Lord.

My hope is that this Advent season, you may also long for God with all your heart, all your mind and all your soul, and that on Christmas day, You will find your heart ablaze with all Christ offers.

Let me begin by **THANKING** everyone who supports the daily activities of our church. And a further message of gratitude to those who supported our 190th anniversary with a special gift.



Downtown United Project Update

In the spring of 2022, a committee of eight people was created, comprising of 4 people from each of the two churches. Our mandate is to explore the possibilities of collaboration between the two churches. We have met several times over the past few months, and have selected and hired a consultant group named Credence & Co. to facilitate this process.

We have met with them, through Zoom, to discuss how we might develop a collaborative process that will produce a joint project to serve downtown Fredericton, as well as serve as a model for possible future collaboration.

For your information, the following is a paragraph prepared by Credence & Co., as an introduction to our congregation:

Credence & Co. is an organization devoted to helping congregations and workplaces thrive. They focus on facilitating organizational health, discernment, visioning, strategic planning, conflict transformation, mediation, diversity work and more! Your consultants for this process (Marijke Strong and Cathy Stewart) are both ordained ministers with extensive experience guiding congregational processes.

It is our intent to follow this collaborative process which will begin with an online survey (also be available in hard copy). The survey will go live on January 8th and everyone in the two congregations will be invited to participate in this survey which will contribute to the direction of this joint venture and we are hoping for participation of 100% of our congregation. eep an eye out in early January for more information.

Sounds of the Season

One can not imagine Christmas without the familiar and comforting hymns that profoundly share the deep meaning of this season. As we move our way towards Christmas, we will slowly shift from Advent waiting hymns to Christmas carols. Downtown United will also be hosting a Carol Sing on December 17th, 2pm here at St. Paul's.

While many of our Christmas songs make perfect sense, have you ever wondered about the 12 days of Christmas. What in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans and a partridge in a pear tree have to do with Christmas?

From 1558-1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice there faith openly. Someone during this era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. Imbedded in the lyrics was a secret meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol is a code for a religious reality the children could remember. Ready to join the crowd of those who know?

The Partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.

Two turtledoves were the Old and New Testaments.

Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.

The four calling birds were the for Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

The five golden rings recall the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.

The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit - Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.

The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.

Nine ladies dancing stood for the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit - Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self-Control.

The ten lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.

The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.

The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles Creed

Beware of Scams

This time of year when our hearts are open, it is important to be aware of who and what you are giving to. Too many people have fallen pray to scams that sound real. Some tips to avoid scams:

- Plan your donations and be the one to initiate giving

- If a request for money or gift cards seems odd, check directly with the organization or individual

Never give out personal details to people you are not 100% sure of.

- Say you need time, don't fall into "urgent" requests. Reputable organizations will not pressure you. Check out the information you're given to make sure it is real.

Also, let us take the opportunity to remind everyone that church staff will never ask you for donations or gift cards to be sent directly to them. Should you ever get a call or email of this nature, report it to the police and please don't respond.

The St Paul's 190th Tree

The symbol of the tree of life was incorporated into our anniversary celebrations. It was to symbolize the growth and faith over the years and a statement that we will continue to impact and grow in the world. The tree showed up on your invitation and banner, but did you know that there is a real tree?

A 190cm Eastern White Pine was planted in the Botanic Garden, in celebration of our years of impacting Fredericton. It was decided to plant the tree off our grounds as a way to point the community to our presence beyond our walls, and provide a passive invitation to check us out.

Evergreens have long been symbolic of life and growth, early Christians brought them into the sanctuaries to symbolize everlasting life in Christ. Evergreen trees have also been used to share our faith, such as the three points of the tree reminding us to the three faces of the trinity and the fact that the tree doesn't loose its needles pointing to the unchanging nature of God.

You are invited to a tree blessing on December 4 @ 1pm. The tree was planted across from the perennial garden. From the Prospect Street parking lot it is about a 3 minute walk.

Serving Others in Christ's Name

As a congregation, we make a difference in our community through partnerships and our own programs. Currently, in house programs are the Pantry and Brown-bag programs. In partnership, we support Campus Ministry, the Angle Tree gift giving, and support learners obtaining their GED. Look at who we touch:

As of November 18th, The Pantry is serving 116 clients. This number is made up of 25 single women, 48 single men, 8 couples, 18 families, 17 single parents and included in this number are 81 children. It also includes a few homeless people.

248 bag lunches were handed out to hungry homeless people, as well as others in need, through the office between September 1st and November 22nd. Meghan hands out as many as 10 bags some mornings.



This year, through our partnership with the Angel Tree program, we will have brought smiles to 40 children this Christmas, whose families were unable to afford a Christmas present for them.

The GED preparation program, which meets in our building, has 6 learners registered in their program this year. We are supporting people in charting a new future through providing space rent free.

We are part of the UNB Campus Ministry, and

through this we offer support to the 10,000 students and staff at UNB and beyond through. Our contributions to Campus Ministry (FCCMC) include space for the council to meet, representation on the council and financial support.
