Towards Resurrection

It is said that we Christians are an Easter People, but what does it mean to be an Easter People? As the heart it means that we believe that the resurrection of Jesus shows us that suffering, disappointment, even what brings death can be transformed into new life. As an Easter People we believe that this pattern is present in our lives now and that it will continue after death. This ultimate focus on resurrection, brings hope and joy in the face of a world that sometimes seems to be dealing only death.

But before we get to the Easter Celebration, the Highest of High holidays in the church, we go through Lent. Which is a 40 day season of the church which traditionally involves prayer, fasting (abstaining from something to reduce distractions and increase focus on God) and almsgiving. It is also time of preparation and has a penitential nature, as we acknowledge our need for God's forgiveness in a more intense way.

I have always thought of Lent as a season for meaning making. As we focus on God and Christ's role in our lives, as we are intentional about practicing our faith, these practices influence our thinking. We start to see the world through different eyes, we start to understand Christ's sacrifice for us more deeply and we start to see our place in God's plan. Like Jesus who went into the desert for 40 days prior to starting his public ministry, the testing and reflecting that happens during this season prepares us for our ministry in the world too. This is one of the blessings of Lent, which for me always brings joy.

We don't often talk about joy during Lent, it sometimes gets buried with the Hallelujahs not making it's appearance until Easter Sunday. But if we truly are an Easter People, then shouldn't joy be part of our conversation always? May this Lent bring you closer to the heart of God where we find pure joy and peace.

Changes Verses Transitions

We often use the words change and transition interchangeably but in the world of change management they have different meanings:

Change - the act or instance of making or becoming different. Change is time limited/specific and an outward or visible event.

Transition - is a passing from one place, state condition, to another. It is the ongoing processing after a change, ones emotional, psychological, mental and spiritual response to change. Transition is inward and spiritual (although may have outward manifestations.)

As way of an example: Change is the physical process of moving from one house to another. Transition is the process of the new place feeling like home.

When everything else in the world seems to be changing, we can hold onto the fact that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and tomorrow." (Hebrews 13:8)

Change as part of Life

The God of creation is constantly working; therefore change is a normal part of life. From the day we are conceived our bodies are constantly changing, the seasons move in cycle and our God of resurrection is always making things new. This doesn't make it easy and sometimes when change is rapid or there is much change it can seem like to much. The story of Exodus can help us see God is always with us and working for us in times of change and transition. Thanks be to God!

Reconsidering How We Use Our Property

The St Paul's Board and Trustees have obtained independent legal advice and, with the support of our Fundy St. Lawrence Dawning Waters Region, have voted to investigate property development with **Kindred Works**.

Kindred Works is an independent company governed by a Board of Directors and staffed with experts with a variety of expertise. It established with an initial grant by the **United Church of Canada**.

The mission of Kindred Works is to create and manage long-term market-rate and affordable housing (rents costing no more than 30% of tenants' income) with the goal of housing 34,000 people over the next 15 years. Other objectives include:

- Providing an income stream for communities of faith,
- Producing 80 per cent less carbon in construction than today's industry standard,
- Having 30% of all housing units accessible by all people regardless of their age or ability.
- Using 10% of its labour from equity-searching groups, and
- Sourcing 80% of its labour and materials locally.

Kindred Works will work with a committee of 4 congregants, who represent the interests of the congregation, to create a **Development Plan** for our property. This at no cost to St. Paul's.

The plan will be presented to the congregation. If accepted, Kindred Works manages all the construction and assumes long-term property and tenant management. Upon completion, St Paul's will be provided with a steady income stream that does not impact our charity status. If the development plan is rejected, a debt of about \$50,000 would be put on our financial records, payable only when the property was sold.

Sabbatical Leave for Rev. Michelle

After serving in a congregation for at least 5 years ministry staff are intitled to a 3 month Sabbatical for learning and renewal. Rev. Michelle will have completed her 6th year as our minister on May 1st of this year. We are happy to announce she will be taking sabbatical starting June 6-September 6th. She will be engaging in deeper learning about leading congregations through change, taking part in a retreat and learning to play some hymns on the Ukulele. Worship, and M&P have been preparing for her time away finding coverage for the congregation. The Region will also appoint a pastoral charge supervisor for us.

Women's Inter-church Council, Fredericton

St. Paul's has been a member of this body of Christian women since its inception. For many years their focus was on presentation of the World Day of Prayer service at various churches around the city on the first Friday of March. This was halted due to covid and the ban on gatherings.

Last winter when I heard that there were no plans for a service in 2022, I contacted Rev. Michelle and she agreed we should hold a service on a Sunday. The service was provided by the women of England, Wales and Northern Ireland. We used the outline and video provided by the national headquarters, but added our own twist to it with Rev. Michelle did a wonderful job on the tech side, mixing our UCW members with readers from other churches and help from Sharon and our Choir. Without Meghan in the office pulling together all the bits together we would have been lost. The theme was "I Know the Plans I have for you" and it was well received. A collection was received for WICC, which provides grants to projects that empower women and children in Canada and around the world. Many thanks to all who contributed by attending, reading, sing-



ing and to our staff for their enthusiasm and good work. May you be blessed.
